Food Skills for Families 🔀 🕴



Family programs offer a safe space for participants to learn and participate in activities that aim to improve literacy skills for both children and adults. Over the past year, more than 220 families participated in food skills programs. A well-balanced and nutritious diet is important for overall physical and mental wellness. From preparing snacks to full meals, families were empowered to explore, get messy, and get cooking! These programs provide numerous benefits and important skill development opportunities.

Settlement & Language Services





By providing services through Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) and British Columbia Settlement and Integration Services (BCSIS), CBAL offers seamless program and service delivery for newcomers. The intake and assessment process is a comprehensive and robust procedure that helps identify the needs, assets, and settlement priorities of a client. This information is then utilized to connect the client to the most appropriate resources and referrals. Settlement services foster inclusivity and diversity that benefit newcomers and communities. Here is an example of how settlement services can directly impact the community.

CBAL partnered with the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary to launch Water Women, a women'sonly swimming program that aimed to remove barriers (religious, cultural, economic, and social) to participating in aquatics. This program was the only one of its kind in the Basin and Boundary and included seven sessions with water safety training and free drop-in swim times on Sunday mornings. CBAL was involved in program design, facilitation, and connecting with community partners. A safe space was created for women to swim, connect with others and with community services.





Books for Kids Campaign

We are thrilled to announce that last year was our most successful campaign to date. Thanks to the overwhelming support of individuals, businesses, and service groups, we were able to raise over \$70,000. Blue Sky Clothing Company's socks for literacy were once again a big hit, providing a fun and unique way for people to support the cause. We also had great success with our Love 2 Learn T-shirts and hoodies, which were seen all around the region. With the donations received, CBAL was able to distribute over 7,000 books and take-home activity kits to families. We are deeply grateful to everyone who contributed to Books for Kids and helped make a difference for the children and families in our communities.

Our Highlights

Professional Development - Learning for Life

Learning for Life 2023 was a remarkable event that took place in May in the beautiful city of Kimberley. A total of 93 participants, which included CBAL facilitators, board members, volunteers, and presenters, attended the event. The event started with an evening social, followed by a day full of learning and networking opportunities. The workshops offered at the event covered a wide range of topics such as Trauma-Informed Practice, Outdoor Play, Come Do Math with Me, Adult Learning and Emotional Intelligence, Blanket Exercise, Teaching Youth to Read, Moving Beyond Polarization, and Gender Diversity.



Strategic Planning

Over the past year, we focused on strategic planning which included gathering feedback from staff and community stakeholders through various means such as surveys, one-to-one interviews, and group discussions. We received valuable insights and ideas that can help CBAL increase its visibility and impact in the region and province.



During the engagement process, we also realized the need to raise awareness and promote literacy as a vital tool for addressing societal issues. Therefore, we aim to support other non-profits and businesses in incorporating literacy in their operations and communications. This could involve providing plain language training, helping employees improve their skills, or supporting local literacy initiatives.



Moving forward, we will focus on the following three priorities:

- 1. Be a leader in literacy and learning
- 2. Ensure responsible and sustainable operations
- 3. Provide high-quality programs and services across the Columbia Basin and Boundary





West Kootenay Local Immigration Partnership

CBAL was granted approval to coordinate the implementation of a local immigration partnership (LIP) in the West Kootenay for the areas surrounding Trail, Castlegar, and Nelson. The decision follows a successful feasibility study conducted in 2022 and is funded through Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada.

The main goal of a LIP is to promote positive outcomes related to settlement and integration by fostering strong and resilient communities through innovative coordination efforts among key stakeholders. These initiatives are community-driven and help to create welcoming and inclusive communities where newcomers can thrive. While settlement services prepare newcomers to settle in the community, LIPs prepare communities to welcome them. CBAL will conduct a research study, establish stakeholder and newcomer advisory committees, and launch a new website specific to the West Kootenay Local Immigration Partnership (WKLIP). CBAL is pleased to be among the 88 LIPs operating across Canada.


